STUDENTS' BILL OF RIGHTS §6443

All students have the right to:

1. Make a report to local law enforcement and/or state police; 2. Have disclosures of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual assault treated seriously; 3. Make a decision about whether or not to

disclose a crime or violation and participate in the judicial or conduct process and/or criminal justice process free from pressure by the institution; 4. Participate in a process that is fair, impartial, and provides adequate notice and a meaningful opportunity to be heard; 5. Be treated with dignity and to receive from the institution courteous, fair, and respectful health care and counseling services, where available; 6. Be free from any suggestion that the reporting individual is at fault when these crimes and violations are committed, or should have acted in a different manner to avoid such crimes or violations; 7. Describe the incident to as few institution representatives as practicable and not be required to unnecessarily repeat a description of the incident; 8. Be protected from retaliation by the institution, any student, the accused and/or the respondent, and/or their friends, family and acquaintances within the jurisdiction of the institution; 9. Access to at least one level of appeal of a determination; 10. Be accompanied by an advisor of choice who may assist and advise a reporting individual, accused, or respondent throughout the judicial or conduct process including during all meetings and hearings related to such process; and 11. Exercise civil rights and practice of religion without interference by the investigative, criminal justice, or judicial or conduct process of the institution.

Mandl is committed to providing support and assistance to victims/survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and/or stalking to ensure that they can continue to participate in college wide and campus programs, activities and employment. All victims/survivors of these offenses, regardless of race, color, national origin, religion, creed, age, disability, sex, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, familial status, pregnancy, predisposing genetic characteristics, military status, domestic violence victim status, or criminal conviction, have the following rights, regardless of whether the crime or violation occurs on campus, off campus, at an externship, or while participating in Mandl sponsored activities.

Students' Bill of Rights in conjunction with New York State Education Law Article 129-B, also known as "Enough is Enough" legislation.

The following Students' Bill of Rights lists the rights students have when reporting sexual offenses (sexual assault, stalking), relationship violence (dating violence, domestic violence), and any other sexual activity that otherwise violates Mandl's code of conduct to the designated administrators of the college:

All students have the right to:

Make a report to local law enforcement and/or state police.

- Have disclosures of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and sexual assault treated seriously.
- Make decisions whether to disclose a crime or violation and participate in the judicial or conduct process and/or criminal justice process free from pressure from the institution.
- Participate in a fair and impartial process which provides adequate notice and an opportunity to be heard.
- Receive counseling services, where available.
- Discuss the incident to as few institutional representatives as possible.
- Not be the subject of any retaliation from the college, accused, and/or the respondent, their family, friends, or associates.
- Access to at least one level of appeal of a determination.
- Be accompanied by an advisor of choice who may assist the reporting person, accused, or respondent throughout the judicial or conduct process including all meetings and hearings related to such process.
- Exercise civil rights and practice of religion without interference by the investigative, criminal justice, or administrative college process.
